Community Relations

Over the past year, CPFD has embarked on a journey to elevate its presence and impact within the local community, yielding remarkable advancements across its diverse program selections. Through strategic initiatives and meaningful engagements, CPFD has not only met but exceeded expectations in several key areas, showcasing its unwavering commitment to community welfare.

Smoke & CO Alarm Program

In a bold leap toward community safety, CPFD enthusiastically joined the State of Michigan Smoke and CO Program in August 2023. The department's proactive approach was evident as, in a mere five months, they conducted 9 home visits, positively affecting 19 occupants by installing an impressive total of 64 smoke and CO alarms. This swift and impactful progress propelled CPFD to a commendable #70 ranking among the 119 statewide participants. Lifted by this success, CPFD is set to build on this momentum, with ambitious plans to further expand and amplify this life-saving program in 2024.

School Visits

During Fire Prevention Month in October, CPFD made a resounding impact by reaching out to hundreds of children in collaboration with Coopersville Area Public Schools and Lamont Christian. Going beyond the conventional approach, the department actively participated in a "Touch the Truck" event at the library, aligning with the year's safety theme focused on Cooking Safety. These engaging interactions not only heightened awareness but also forged stronger bonds between CPFD and the community, underscoring the vital importance of fire prevention education.

Child Seat Safety Inspections

Demonstrating an unwavering commitment to ensuring the safety of the community's youngest members, CPFD took proactive measures by sending its members for certification in Child Seat Safety Inspections and Installations. Post-certification, CPFD has successfully inspected and installed a substantial number of car seats, contributing significantly to the well-being of families and reinforcing the department's dedication to comprehensive safety initiatives.



MI Fire Equipment Grant: \$20,000

In mid-2023, we were awarded \$20,000 from the State of Michigan's Fire Equipment Grant. We utilized the funds to cover the purchase of Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) masks and turnout gear. These critical pieces of equipment are essential for the safety and efficiency of our firefighting personnel.

PAR Plan Grant: \$2,638.68

The grant we received for the purchase and installation of the HAAS alerting system has significantly contributed to the safety of our personnel and the public. This system, which sends real-time digital alerts to motorists, allows for a safer response environment. We are diligently working on the installation of these units in 2023 and anticipate increased safety outcomes as a result.

DNR Volunteer Fire Capacity Grant Program: \$4,550

Our success in securing a 50/50 matching grant from the Department of Natural Resources for wildland/tech rescue gear in December 2022 is a testament to our dedication to firefighter safety. We appreciate the opportunity to acquire gear that is lighter and more maneuverable, reducing stress during operations in hotter months.

Moving forward, we aim to expand our grant applications to acquire additional firefighting tools and equipment that will further enhance the safety and effectiveness of our operations. We are actively exploring opportunities to improve our rescue equipment, communication systems, and specialized tools to better serve our community.

While 2023 did not witness the extensive apparatus changes that characterized 2022, the year brought forth its own set of unique surprises that significantly enhanced the capabilities of our department.

Addition of Water Rescue Unit

One noteworthy addition to CPFD's resources in 2023 was an unexpected gift – a 1998 Sea Doo Bombardier jet ski, generously donated by an anonymous benefactor. This jet ski marks the inaugural inclusion of a water rescue apparatus within the department's inventory. The acquisition is poised to transform our response capabilities in waterrelated emergencies, offering swift deployment for efficient interventions. The department is scheduled to relocate the jet ski to its designated home in the spring of 2023, with comprehensive training sessions to follow suit.

Ottawa County Fire Chief's Air Trailer

Additionally, CPFD proudly became the custodian of the Ottawa County Fire Chief's Air Trailer during the course of the year. This specialized equipment plays a crucial role in refilling Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBAs) during extended fire incidents. Furthermore, the air trailer is made available to neighboring departments, enabling them to replenish their cascade systems. CPFD not only provides the trailer but also commits manpower for its operation, serving as a valuable asset to the broader community in times of need.








Reponses by Year







Calls by Day of Week




