LETTER FROM THE CHIEF



Like many years past, 2024 will be one for the books. Our department persevered and looked toward the future while responding to our highest call volume to date—840 calls. The members of this department continued to step up and push themselves to be the best they could be.

Early in the year, we accomplished our goal of achieving Basic Life Support (BLS) Non-Transport status with the graduation of additional EMTs from the matriculation course. Returning to this licensure after many years was no easy feat. It required careful planning, the dedication of our members to pursue higher education, and the necessary funding to properly equip our apparatus with essential medical gear. Since this transition, I have personally witnessed the positive impact of our enhanced medical capabilities have made within our community.

Thanks to the generosity of our municipalities, we were able to hire a full-time firefighter/EMT, Ethan Rahn, to assist during the daytime hours when availability is at its lowest. This additional position has already proven to be a great asset to the department, strengthening community relations and ensuring coverage when I may not be available. I look forward to seeing how this role continues to evolve and support our department's needs.

A milestone for our department in 2024 was the launch of our Cadet Program. This initiative engages high school students in the Coopersville area who are interested in firefighting and emergency medical response. Following a thorough selection process, we welcomed our first two cadets, Noah and Mikaedam. These cadets were assigned mentors and worked closely with our Recruitment and Retention Committee to build a strong foundation in firefighting and medical response. Upon completing their initial training, they became eligible to respond to certain calls, gaining valuable real-world experience. Our goal is to foster the next generation of firefighters through this program.

As our community continues to grow, we remain committed to providing the highest level of service through training, preparedness, and community engagement. We look forward to serving Coopersville and Polkton Township into 2025 and beyond.

Community Relations

In 2024, we continued to expand our presence and impact within the community, attending 28 events and strengthening our outreach programs. These efforts allowed us to connect with residents, promote fire safety, and provide essential services beyond emergency response.

Smoke & CO Alarm Program

Since joining the State of Michigan Smoke and CO Program in August 2023, we have made significant strides in improving home safety. After conducting 9 home visits and installing 64 smoke and carbon monoxide alarms in our first few months, we greatly expanded the program in 2024. Our team visited 50 homes, installing 270 smoke alarms and 93 carbon monoxide alarms. CPFD remains committed to this life-saving initiative, ensuring more households have the protection they need.

Fire Prevention Education & School Visits

During Fire Prevention Month in October, CPFD collaborated with Coopersville Area Public Schools and Lamont Christian to educate hundreds of children about fire safety. Through hands-on demonstrations and interactive lessons, we reinforced critical safety skills while strengthening our connection with local families. These efforts highlight our ongoing commitment to proactive fire prevention.

Child Seat Safety Inspections

In our first full year of offering car seat safety inspections, our certified technicians inspected and installed car seats in 14 vehicles. Looking ahead to 2025, we aim to expand the program by increasing community awareness and hosting additional on-site inspection events to ensure even more children travel safely.

Grants

DNR Volunteer Fire Capacity Grant Program: \$4,550

Through a successful 50/50 matching grant from the Department of Natural Resources, CPFD acquired nine sets of Innotex Wildland/Tech Rescue protective gear. This equipment enhances firefighter safety during wildland and technical rescue operations. The new gear was placed into service in December 2024.

State of Michigan Turnout Gear Grant: \$3,300

To support departments with full-time personnel, the State of Michigan provided grant funding for additional turnout gear. CPFD successfully applied for this grant and received funding to reimburse the purchase of a second set of turnout gear for the Fire Chief in 2024, ensuring readiness and compliance with safety standards.



In 2024, no apparatus were added or removed from service. As part of our ongoing commitment to safety and reliability, all apparatus underwent **annual DOT inspections and regular maintenance**. These preventative measures allow us to identify and address potential issues before they escalate, ensuring our fleet remains in top condition.

Notable maintenance and repairs completed in 2024 included:

- Ladder 441 Suspension replacement, DEF header repair, and alternator replacement.
- Engine 421 Intake heater repair.
- Squad 471 Bodywork following a deer collision in December 2023.

By staying proactive with maintenance, CPFD ensures our apparatus remain operational and ready to respond when needed.



In 2024, our department continued its commitment to enhancing knowledge and skills by completing a total of 71 trainings. These sessions equipped our firefighters with diverse expertise, covering areas from water rescue to emergency medical care and fire attack strategies. In collaboration with the Allendale Township Fire Department in October 2024, we conducted live burn exercises focusing on fire attack and search and rescue techniques. These scenarios provided invaluable insights for our training committee, guiding our priorities into 2025.





Throughout these advancements, our members have demonstrated their dedication to improving service delivery through continuous training and readiness.


Reponses by Year




RESPONSE BY CALL TYPE





Calls by Day of Week






Average Personnel by Day of the Week
